



Affiliate vs. Member

While membership in Minnesota Campus Compact is limited to presidents and chancellors of accredited higher education institutions in Minnesota, leaders at other organizations or associations that share a commitment to the democratic purposes of higher education are welcome to become affiliates of Minnesota Campus Compact. Affiliate status is a new opportunity first offered in 2016-17; see the initial list of affiliates at <http://mncampuscompact.org/our-affiliates/>.

To become an affiliate, the Executive Director, CEO, or Principal of an organization submits a letter indicating a desire to join Minnesota Campus Compact (MNCC) as an affiliate and expressing the organization's support for our mission. Subject to review of the board, our staff will then prepare a dues invoice for the organization and request contact information for key people to receive information, publications, and any other communications directly from MNCC.

Affiliate Benefits

Connections with both public and private higher education leaders around a shared sense of civic purpose. Member campuses build partnerships and educate students in ways that reflect their distinctive missions and contexts, yet through this coalition, presidents, faculty, staff, students, and community stakeholders inspire, inform, and collaborate with each other. Most of our presidents and chancellors have signed the national Campus Compact 30th anniversary action statement committing to:

- Empower our students, faculty, staff, and community partners to co-create mutually respectful partnerships in pursuit of a just, equitable, and sustainable future for communities beyond the campus—nearby and around the world;
- Prepare our students for lives of engagement, with the motivation and capacity to deliberate, act, and lead in pursuit of the public good;
- Embrace our responsibilities as place-based institutions, contributing to the health and strength of our communities—economically, socially, environmentally educationally and politically; and
- Harness the capacity of our institutions—through research, teaching, partnerships, and institutional practices—to challenge the prevailing social and economic inequalities that threaten our democratic future.

Visibility for your organization's civic and community engagement commitments. In addition to highlighting members and affiliates through our newsletter, events, awards, blog, Twitter feed, digital resources, and publications, we offer opportunities to connect directly with presidents, faculty, staff, student, and community leaders from across the state through major events (e.g., an annual statewide summit), networking and professional development opportunities, sponsorships, and more.

Engagement strategies that support the success of Minnesota's increasingly diverse students. MNCC, our members, and researchers have found that community engagement is a high-impact educational practice for students from all backgrounds, contributing both to academic achievement and retention. Our programs offer strong models, insights, and diverse consultants to inform related work.

Support for everyone from newcomers to this work to highly experienced professionals.

Through workshops, presentations, convenings, and consultations, MNCC provides introductory to advanced information on many forms of engagement (e.g., service-learning, community-based research, work-study, and internships, civic dialogue, social entrepreneurship, institutional partnerships), as well as opportunities for networking and reflection. Evaluations consistently show participants gain new connections, knowledge, skills, resources, and ideas for action.

Access to external resources that build capacity for campus-community partnerships. Through the College Health Corps, for example, full-time AmeriCorps VISTAs support campus-community partnerships that promote health care access and health education among low-income Minnesotans. These VISTAs can be hosted at member institutions, affiliates, or their community partners.

Consideration for board membership. Up to 25% of Minnesota Campus Compact's board of directors may be leaders other than member campus presidents or chancellors. Interested individuals at affiliate organizations may contact the staff to request the governance committee and board consider their candidacy when a position is open.

Select Opportunities for MNCC Members and Affiliates – 2017-18

Civic Agency Initiative – online workshop facilitation guides, toolkits, and other resources to build civic agency and leadership capacity through self-knowledge, skills for working collaboratively, and strategies for making change – *an initial set of 19 workshop guides is freely accessible on our website; staff will lead workshops or consult with other potential facilitators upon request*

College Health Corps AmeriCorps VISTA – full-time AmeriCorps VISTAs support campus-community partnerships that serve low-income Minnesotans, with a focus on increasing health care access and health education and supporting low-income college student success – *please contact us if interested in hosting a VISTA for 2018-19; letters of intent will be due in late 2017, full applications in early 2018; the 14 VISTA positions for 2017-18 are already filled*

Communities of Practice – a collaborative learning and leadership initiative, with six groups focused on critical topics related to community engagement and equity, reflective practice, dialogue across differences, collaborative research, and partnerships within and across higher education institutions – *interested staff may apply to participate through September 8, 2017; participants will convene in person in Minneapolis on October 13, 2017, then meet virtually throughout the academic year*

Statewide Summit and Awards Ceremony – an annual opportunity to honor student leaders, community partners, and faculty or staff civic engagement stewards with MNCC Presidents' Awards, and for all participants to share their good work and discuss key issues – *April 19, 2018, at Hamline University*

Information sharing – monthly email newsletter and website with resources highly valued by members, including additional opportunities for professional development, presenting, and grants

Customized assistance – we encourage members and affiliates to contact us if we might be helpful in presenting workshops, facilitating strategic discussions, serving on committees, identifying useful models, contacts, or resources, answering questions or listening to your ideas – *available any time upon request*
